DIRECTIONS

- 1) Students will get a mat and counters.
- 2) Students will listen as the teacher says a sentence.
- 3) Students will place a counter on the shell for each word they hear in the sentence and then count the counters to show how many words they heard.

QUICK DIFFERENTIATION

KIDS THAT NEED A CHALLENGE:

I) Have students write out the sentence, paying attention to the fact that spaces separate each word.


KIDS THAT NEED A REVIEW:


